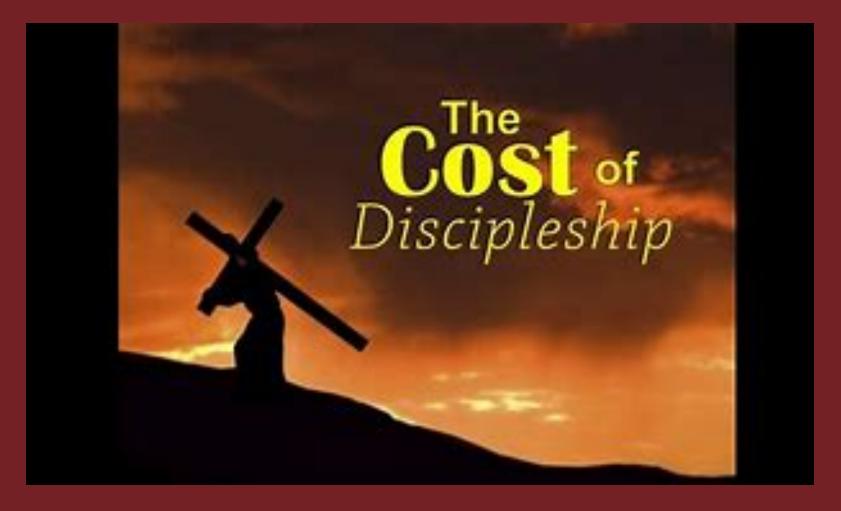
THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP

...of prayer


Prayer too is something that, while it should be constant in public and in private, needs to remain in a sense hidden.

That doesn't mean it can't be seen by others. But it can't be done for the purpose of being seen by others.


Pure prayer, prayer that is an expression of extraordinary righteousness, is the unfettered, unedited cry of a longing heart or gratitude of a joyful heart to God.

THE SIMPLICITY OF THE CAREFREE LIFE



- Only a life unencumbered by anxiety about worldly goods and comforts can be dedicated to God.
- This is as much about our relationship with time as it is about our relationship with possessions:
 - C. S. Lewis in the Screwtape Letters stated that the devil's greatest work happens we our minds are focused on the future. The present is where we will find God, and perhaps even in the past, but in worrying about the future we are completely separated from God. What do you think of this?

THE SIMPLICITY OF THE CAREFREE LIFE

Bonhoeffer rightly points out that Jesus does not mean we can have absolutely no dealings with the world and especially that the poor cannot concern themselves with working for their daily bread. He is not trying to starve his followers. He is giving them a commandment that leads to utter freedom, not to abject poverty.

How does this work? What are the hallmarks of our calling to this simple, carefree life in God?
